The European Research Group on Military and Society (ERGOMAS) is an interdisciplinary, international scientific association devoted to collaborative research on military and society. The Working Group on Military and Police Relations (WG 9)

It also encompasses the rich and under-researched areas of paramilitary policing, military and police accountability, including operations under international and domestic rule of law, and international police operations. In seeking to strengthen its knowledge and capacities on police and policing systems, the working group also encourages studies focusing solely on the police or gendarme organization and relevant aspects such as comparative police models, police occupational culture, police professionalization, police accountability and oversight systems, and non-state policing.
